There is an an AFRICAN proverb that I love. It says, "If you can walk you can dance and if you can talk you can sing". This is something that I think every child should hear. Global Vibe is my physical response to that notion.

I love to travel, mostly because it allows me to visit with people who honour music and dance and who allow these arts to be a central part of their lives. I have visited such places, namely Africa and India. Dancing is universal, movement is natural and it can be a powerful educational tool.

While pondering the new school show assignment I discovered a charming "travel" book for kids, entitled Children Just like Me by Annabel and Barnaby Kinderseley. It is a UNICEF picture book that introduces the reader to various young people from around the world. It has beautiful pictures of them and their families, and illustrates what they eat, how they play and where they live. This book along with the television/ video series called Dancing provided tremendous inspiration. The series opens with a statement that goes something like... "In trying on the dances of other cultures we can reach across the borders of fear and prejudice in order to foster tolerance and respect..." With my very talented collaborators. I have taken this as the rallying cry for Global Vibe: A celebration of

Dance. I have experienced this on a personal level and can recommend this ethnographic approach to understanding your neighbour.

The rich and endless variety of dance that surrounds us locally and globally, are magnificently diverse, yet contain many common themes and purposes. The global village is an exciting place - so much to learn, so much to share.

This work is dedicated to our wonderful human spirit as it is enhanced by the joyful state created by music and dance, here, there and everywhere.





South African boot dance and Fraternity


