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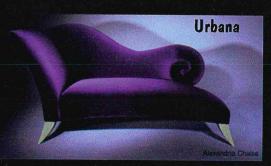
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Welcome to DJD's 1997/98 season opener, "Optic Verve" - an evening that offers our audience perhaps the most diverse look at jazz dance we've produced in some time, with six premieres by seven choreographers bringing seven different backgrounds to their work. Of these, only three choreographers are Calgarians, DJD's Associate Artistic Director Michèle Moss and her collaborator Tara Wilson, and me. The other four are special guests, commissioned by DJD to create works especially for "Optic Verve".

This evening's eclectic collection of dances is a result of our Artistic Team's ongoing, active search for guest choreographers to contribute to our vast body of jazz works. Jazz dance is rare, and jazz artists who truly mesh themselves with jazz music are even more rare. Vicki, Michèle and I spend most of our summers seeking artists with philosophies or sensibilities similar to our collective vision of jazz dance, a vision we've nurtured, explored and expanded over the past fourteen years. These fine artists whose work you are viewing tonight are some of the gems we have discovered along our way. Together with the company's dancers, we are truly grateful to our management and Board of Directors for their creative efforts to support our dreams for Decidedly Jazz Danceworks. Together, we are doing something remarkable.

We're thrilled that two special guests, Billy Siegenfeld and Jeannie Hill, who have created wonderful dances for us in the recent past, have returned this season to contribute new works for our company. Billy Siegenfeld delights in making "music for the eyes" - his style is percussive, often hard hitting, and if you look and listen well, you will not be surprised to know that Billy has led an interesting life, including a period as a jazz drummer. Jeannie Hill is a percussionist of a different type, having been a member of Manhattan Tap for the past seven years. Those of you who saw "Rhythm Addiction" last spring will remember Jeannie's rockin' tap dance finale. This time around, Jeannie has combined jazz and tap dance, and the inspiration of an old social dance, "The Big Apple". Throw in a little of Jeannie's own comedic side, and you get the loonie, cartoon-like "Crayola Romp".

A familiar name at the Decidedly Jazz Dance School, guest artist Katherine Kramer returned to Calgary this fall to work for the first time as a choreographer for our company (as well as teach a few inspiring workshops at our school). Also an accomplished tap dancer, Katherine chose to create her sweet, playful dance without tap shoes, using design in space, improvisation, and of course the Brazillian rhythms in the music to challenge the dancers in "Four Play".

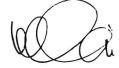

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VICKI ADAMS WILLIS

Founding Artistic Director / Choreographer

Calgary born Vicki Adams Willis carries on a family dance tradition which began when her mother, Alice (Murdoch) Adams opened one of the first dance schools in the city in the 1920's. Vicki began her studies with her aunt, Jean (Murdoch) Simpson. Those initial studies focused primarily on ballet, but as a teenager she became interested in jazz. Soon that interest grew into a passion.

Vicki's primary influence in jazz has been the study of jazz history, the study of historical jazz dance forms and African - American vernacular dance styles. Some of the teachers who have furthered her understanding of jazz have been Margot McDermott, Luigi, Matt Mattox and Betsy Haug. Vicki's research into the enormous yet elusive study of jazz has taken her literally all over the globe with frequent forays to New York, Los Angeles, New Orleans, England and France.

Upon graduating from the University of Calgary with a B.F.A. in 1972, Vicki was offered a teaching post at the U. of C. within the Drama Department. When the Programme of Dance became a reality, Vicki founded the first and only Division of Jazz Dance in Canadian Universities and Colleges and headed the Division until her resignation. After sixteen years, Vicki gave up her tenured position to devote herself full time to the Decidedly Jazz Danceworks' Professional Company and dance school, both of which she co-founded in 1984.

Teaching since 1966, and choreographing professionally since 1971, Vicki's experience is vast and unique. Her gift for passing on the very

essence of jazz to dancers is unparalleled. Winner of the University of Calgary's "Superior Teacher Award" in 1980, Vicki's dance classes are full to capacity whenever and wherever she teaches. Vicki was honoured to have taught last summer at the prestigious Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival in Massachusetts.

Jazz choreographers are rare, and Ms. Willis is the rarest of them all! Her deep understanding and utter respect for the form of jazz dance combine with her outstanding sense of theatre, her inherent tender nature and her perfect sense of humour to create dances that delight audiences and impress critics, and the priority that the company has made of collaborating with jazz musicians gives Willis the perfect outlet for her sensational musicality.



LINDA BABINS

Lighting Designer

This is Linda's first time working For Decidedly Jazz Danceworks, Linda is based in Calgary, and has worked for Alberta Ballet Company and School, Calgary Opera, Alberta Theatre Projects, The Banff Centre, Pleiades Theatre and Lunchbox Theatre. Farther afield, Linda has designed for Western Canada Theatre Company, The Globe Theatre. Citadel Theatre and Stephenville Festival. Memorable works include: Chinook Winds '97, and Oh My Baby, 1995 for the Banff Centre; Travesties, The Globe Theatre; Waiting for the Parade, Citadel Theatre, and Outrageous Alberta Theatre Projects. Linda was trained at Concordia University, The Banff Centre and Stratford Festival.



KIMBERLEY COOPER

Dancer

is enjoying her 9th season with DJD. Born in Calgary, she began dance studies at age 4 and several years later was bitten by the jazz bug. Kimberley has either seen or been part of every DJD production since the company's inception. Her studies have taken her to New York, and her passion for dance has kept her busy dancing with DJD and with Intravenous Improv Group, choreographing for Alberta Dance Explosions and University of Calgary 's Mainstage, guesting with Springboard Dance and teaching in the DJD school. Kim spent last summer in Spain, travelling and studying flamenco.

Dancer

Sarisa is now enjoying her fourth season with DJD and also teaches at the DJD school.

Dancer

began her association with DJD at age 18 as a scholarship student. The following year she moved to New York to study dance, returning in January '91 to understudy DJD's "No Small Feets". After 2 years at the University of Calgary pursuing her degree in Education and dancing on the side, she rejoined DJD as an apprentice in '94 and was promoted to full time dancer the following year. Outside dance projects for Jamie include quest dancing and choreography for Calgary groups such as Youth Dance Unlimited, the University of Calgary's Dance Montage, DSW's Dance Explosions and Springboard Dance. Jamie also enjoys

teaching at the Decidedly Jazz school. In recent years, Jamie has studied dance in London, England and New York City.



JEANNIE HILL

Guest Choreographer

is a principal member of the Jump Rhythm Jazz Project (Billy Siegenfeld, Artistic Director) with whom she has been touring since 1989. She also, for the past 7 years, toured internationally with Manhattan Tap. Hill teaches tap and jazz dance in N.Y. C. and while touring. She has choreographed for Manhattan Tap, DJD, Alaska Dance Theatre and several University groups as well as for the musical theatre stage. In 1995. Hill made a debut of her own show, 'Girl Talk', an evening of comedy which she co-wrote. Her comic country trio, 'The Chalks' continues to gig in New York City.



JOANNE IRVING

Dancer

graduated from the Honours Program in Dance at the University of Waterloo in '92. Since then her dancing legs have taken her to Toronto, Vancouver, Los Angeles, and this summer she returned to the Bates Dance Festival in Lewiston,

Maine as well as attending Lisangua Bato African dance camp. Joanne joined DJD as an apprentice in '93 and was promoted to full time dancer in '94. Teaching Modern and Jazz at the DJD school as well as at other schools in Calgary keeps her busy, but she has also managed to find time to guest with local modern company Springboard Dance, participate in the Alberta Dance Explosions, and choreograph for Youth Dance Unlimited.



KATHERINE KRAMER

Choreographer

began her professional work in the early 1970's as a modern dancer, working with a number of choreographers, including Bill T. Jones, Arnie Zane and Laura Dean. She choreographed for theatre and dance during that period, directing two of her own companies along the way. For over 20 years Katherine has been a vital presence in the resurgence and development of classic jazz and tap, performing with some of the finest tap dancers including Gregory Hines, Savion Glover, Brenda Bufalino and the late Honi Coles, She tours two one-woman shows, "Tap Roots" and "Rhythms of the Heart", and has appeared at Children's Festivals in Seattle, Calgary and Saskatoon, and in concert venues ranging from a coliseum in Ambato, Ecuador, to Jacob's Pillow in Massachusetts, the Discover Jazz Festival in Vermont and the New York Tap Extravaganza. She received an Al Smith Fellowship for Choreography from the Kentucky Arts Council and over the past four years has choreographed for the University of Calgary, Youth Dance Unlimited, Stephens College, Manhattanville College, University of Alaska, Skidmore College and the New Orleans Center

for the Creative Arts. Katherine recently

completed work as choreographer and movement coach for the soon to be released film The Horse Whisperer starring & directed by Robert Redford. She teaches residencies and master classes throughout the country for Universities, Dance Educators of America and arts organizations. In July she will host a 10 day workshop in jazz and tap in Bozeman, Montana. She holds a BFA in Dance from Marymount Manhattan College and a Masters Degree in Movement and Dance from Wesleyan University. Her articles have appeared in the International Tap Associations Journal and Attitude Magazine.



KATHRYN MCKINNON

Apprentice

began dancing in her home town of Regina. Her studies took her to Toronto and then to Montréal. Upon graduating from L'Ecole Superieure de Danse du Québec, she danced with Le Jeune Ballet du Québec. Returning to Toronto, she danced with Ontario Ballet Theatre for three seasons. Kathryn also had the opportunity to dance with Banff Festival Ballet during '96 & '97.

MICHAEL MONTANARO

Guest Choreographer

Michael has a background that has crossed the boundaries of many artistic forms. Accomplished as a composer, a musician, an actor and multimedia artist, he is best known for his work in the field of dance. A graduate of the Hartford Conservatory, Michael has performed with the Boston Ballet, Berkshire Ballet, Les Grands Ballets Canadiens and Le Group de la Place Royale. In 1980 he was named Assistant Artistic Director of "Le Groupe", a position he held for five years, during which time he became well known for his



endeavours as a choreographer, creating over 15 original works. In 1985, he returned to Montréal to form his own company, Montanaro Dance. Since that time he has created A Matter of Seconds for Québec-Eté Danse; The Beginning of the End for Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers; When you least expect it, Here I am... for Le Groupe de la Place Royale; and Two Stepping in Brazil for the company Danse Partout. In 1989 Michael choreographed The Audition, a film produced by The National Film Board to celebrate their Fiftieth Anniversary. With Montanaro Dance, he has created Parallel Lines; East of Egypt: The Theory of Everything; Un Temps Perdu de Zman Doe which was specifically created for the Vieux-Port of Montréal, and later revised for traditional theatres; and Non Angli Sed Angeli, which was recently praised as the "Best Dance Performance" by the Singapore Straits Times in their wrap-up coverage of the prestigious Singapore Festival of Arts. 1994 was a year of experimentation beginning a nine week residency at the University of Arizona's "Institute for Studies in the Arts" where he collaborated with a team of multimedia artists on a work using video sensing technology. Time In The Eye Of The Needle, a 50 minute interactive work was presented both in Arizona and as part of this years ISEA conference in Montréal. This past year has been a busy one with Michael creating works for Montréal's Centaur Theatre's production of Shakespeare's A Winters Tale and the Opéra de Montréal multimedia version of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. After completing a three week residency at the University of Calgary, where he both choreographed and performed, Michael began work on the feasibility study and concept for a high tech theme park to be located in Portugal. He also continues teaching creative process, choreography and contemporary dance technique at Concordia University in Montréal.



MICHÈLE MOSS

Founding Associate Artistic Director / Choreographer/Dancer

has lived, worked and studied around the globe, from Liverpool to Berlin, Paris to Africa, India to Montréal. Along with Vicki Adams Willis and Hannah Stilwell, she founded DJD where she choreographs, dances, teaches, and is the DJD Dance School Principal. She has guested with One Yellow Rabbit, choreographed for a variety of groups and teaches at the U of C. Michèle is the proud mother of 2 year old Odessa Jean Johnston, who has brought her incredible joy.



NATALIE POISSANT

Dancer

After dancing all her life, she took a brief hiatus only to discover that dance was something she couldn't live without. In '94 she returned to dance and was an apprentice with DJD for the '94-'95 season. Enjoying her third year as a full company member, Natalie is also an emerging choreographer and teacher.





BILLY SIEGENFELD

Guest Choreographer

is the Artistic Director of the Chicagobased Jump Rhythm Jazz Project, a national and international touring group of dancer-singer-actors and musicians whose performances, workshops and classes celebrate the arts of jazz music, musical theatre and above all the dancing that is created and performed to the exuberant syncopated rhythms of swinging jazz music, the blues and latin jazz. His choreography has also been seen on the companies of Decidedly Jazz Danceworks (Canada), Gus Giordano Jazz Dance Chicago, Joffrey II Dancers, JazzsCool (Netherlands), Ballet Pacifica. Tennessee Dance Theatre, and those of the University of Alaska, the University of Minnesota, Randolph-Macon Women's College and Northwestern University. He is the recipient of the Ruth Page Dance Achievement Award for Outstanding Choreography (1997) and the Jazz Dance World Congress Gold Leo Award for Outstanding Choreography (1994) as well as three NEA grants, and has served as choreography adjudicator for the American College Dance Festival Association. He is currently a professor of dance and music theatre at Northwestern University and continues to serve as a quest faculty member at Broadway Dance Center in New York City. At both of these venues as well as on tour and in downtown Chicago, Siegenfeld teaches among other subjects, his original Jump Rhythm Jazz Techniques, whose rhythm-first movement approach helps transform performers' bodies into musically articulate, energy-driven percussion

instruments. He has also taught this technique at Jacob's Pillow, the American Dance Festival, Jazzart, Harvard Summer Dance, Le Festival International de Danse (France), Internationale Tanzwerkstatt (Germany), International Summer School of Dance (Tokyo), the Chicago Human Rhythm Project Festival, the Southern California Tap Festival, and the American Tap Dance Orchestra's Winter Intensive.



HANNAH STILWELL

Artistic Director, Optic Verve/Choreographer

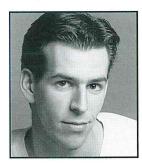
has been happily dancing for over three decades. She holds a BA from The University of Calgary, where she often teaches jazz, West African dance and Rhythm for dancers. In Calgary she dances, teaches, choreographs and is DJD's Director of Dancer Development.

Apprentice

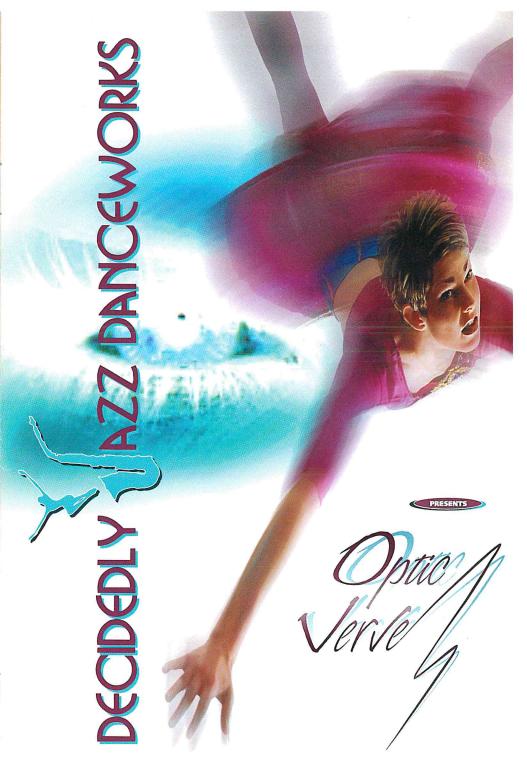

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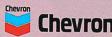

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HISTORY

he beginning was a dream shared by Vicki Adams Willis (then founding head of the Jazz Division of the Program of Dance at the University of Calgary) and two of her graduating students, Michèle Moss and

Hannah Stilwell.

In 1984 they created Decidedly Jazz Danceworks with the goal of preserving and promoting the rich history and spirit of jazz. The original company had four dancers and an Artistic Director intent on sharing their vision of jazz with others. Now in its fourteenth year, DJD has carved a niche for itself in the heart of Canada's dance audience. DJD is Canada's only professional dance company with jazz music and dance as its raison d'être.

Jazz dance is a North American performing art form with its roots in African and European dance and music. It was born on the streets of America as an African -American vernacular social dance form. It is a contemporary dance expression that has evolved and changed drastically over the years through the influences of virtually all dance genres. In its purest form it is deliberately and inherently accessible - in essence, a type of folk dance. It is expressive of human nature, grounded in the emotions of human experience, and therefore has a universal appeal. It is sophisticated rhythmically, as well as playful,

competitive, soulful and a direct reflection of jazz music.

The DJD style has evolved out of the work of the three company founders. As progressive historians, these artists are purposefully aware of and connected to the African and historical roots and spirit of jazz, as well as committed to the evolution and future of the form.

Whenever possible DJD incorporates live music into its performances and classes, and has featured and performed with jazz music notables such as Mark Murphy, Big Miller, Tommy Banks, P.J. Perry and Diane Miller as well as with tap notables Buster Brown and Heather Cornell. The company's trademark respect for and connection to the music has lead many to describe DJD performances as "music for the eyes".

The Calgary -based company has toured throughout Alberta,
Saskatchewan, British Columbia and the Maritimes, as well as to Ottawa, Yellowknife, the Montreal Jazz
Festival, Chicago and Japan.

In addition to performing and touring, DJD's mandate includes a strong educational component. The Decidedly Jazz Danceworks School has an enrollment of over 700 students between the ages of 2 and 72, studying Jazz, African, Tap, Modern, Ballet, East Indian, Flamenco, Funk, Percussion, Pilates, Swing, Steppin', Stretch and Strength, and Yoga. In addition, the professional company does school tours and residencies, and teaches workshops and master classes in Jazz, Jazz History, Tap, Funk and African to all ages and levels.

NUMBER 1 RHYTHM CLUB (\$5,000+)

The first Jazz appreciation society was formed under this same name in 1933.
